Night Shade

There have been four Shires from two different farms, reported dying recently in Iowa. They have all died out in the pasture with no apparent struggle, within a week or two of each other. The cause of death has not been definitely determined but there have been University staff working on the problem. Vet autopsies have been made on two, but no definite determination has been made.

Extension Specialists have been called in to examine the premises and try to help determine the exact cause of these deaths. They have not found conclusive evidence but all indication is pointing toward Black Night Shade.

Night Shade can be found in a number of environments, most often in wooded areas, along roadsides, amongst wild growth on farmland, and in open pastures and fields. In both cases these deaths occurred near a lower part of the field, where they have found Night Shade plants. These

plants look to have been eaten and this is the time when they are in their berry production cycle. The berries cause the most concern, as this is the most toxic part of the plant.

Night Shade is naturally distasteful to horses, and as a rule they do not prefer the taste of this plant over other grazing foods. More often it



is eaten unintentionally when parts of the plant make it into the horse's food supply, perhaps the fallen leaves from the Night Shade were razed along with the grass, or when there is a lack of grazing material for the horse to choose from. This year Night Shade seems to be causing the problem during a drought phase in the middle of the summer, when pastures are thin and not as lush. This is when they can find Night Shade in the draws and more moist areas of the field.

There is not absolute proof that these Shires died because of ingesting Night Shade, but all signs point toward a possible factor in their deaths. There are a number of different Night Shade plants which are perennials, and spraying this fall might do some good, but you should continue to monitor your pastures in the spring and eradicate any plants, so you can eliminate any possible problems with this plant in the future.

National Shire Show

If the 2017 National Shire Show is a weatherglass for the breed's staying power, then the Shire's future is significantly more promising than it has been in years past. As the Shire continues to revamp his autograph from work horse to athlete to superior halter horse, our industry colleagues are not only taking notice, they definitely approve of what they see.

Iowa crowds endorsed the impressive turnout of Shire six-horse hitches with enthusiasm, and the breed's presence was as solid as it was welcome for the duration of the show. Wareing Shires of Blackfoot, Idaho; Greenlee Farms of Pine Grove, Pennsylvania; Dakota Thunder Shires of Sioux Falls, South Dakota; and Jenson Shires of Blair, Nebraska comprised the four sixes; two gelding hitches and two mare hitches, respectively. Joe Biren took top honors with Dakota Thunder, followed closely by Wayne Wareing for Wareing Shires in the six-horse hitch competition.

Dr. Jeff Gower's Soaring Eagle Farms launched its Shire program in 2016 with imports from Thorpe Hill Farm of York, U.K. Soaring Eagle presented two powerful, high-hocked stallions at the national show which sparked renewed optimism for rejuvenating Shire genetics on this side of the Atlantic. The two-year-old bay stallion, Crossingtons Tobias, was named champion stallion, followed by Howell Brothers Opie, owned by Wareing Shires, taking reserve champion. Soaring Eagle's entry, Westwind Grand Emily, took top mare honors with the champion award, followed by Clark Jenson's mare, Jenson's Diplomat Destiny taking reserve. Destiny also high-stepped her way to the blue in the registered Shire mare cart. Longstanding favorite and champion gelding, Landcliffe Master, known as "Quill" deservedly won the supreme Shire award. The veteran gelding has led the Wareing hitch for many years, claiming countless championships and supreme halter awards.

This year's national show kicked off with a banquet lunch and meetand-greet right on the fairgrounds, only a short walk from the horse barns. Dr. Jeff Gower sponsored the catered meal for the ASHA while national show coordinator, Lisa Banga Graham, hosted the casual event prior to the commencement of the show. We were joined by our official judge, Malcolm Yeadon, of Woodstock, Ontario. Each farm was provided national show tee-shirts in their farm colors.

The Iowa State Fair has been home to the National Shire Show for only a few years, but is serving us well as an annual venue for showcasing the breed. The first ISF was held October 25–27, 1854 in Fairfield before relocating in 1886 to its present 445-acre location, making the site 129 years old.

The Livestock Conservancy

What is The Livestock Conservancy and Why Should I Become a Member?

The Organizational Statement of the Livestock Conservancy; protects genetic diversity in livestock and poultry species through the conservation and promotion of endangered breeds. These rare breeds are part of our national heritage and represent a unique piece of the earth's biodiversity. The loss of these breeds would impoverish agriculture and diminish the human spirit. We have inherited a rich variety of livestock breeds. For the sake of future generations, we must work together to safeguard these treasures. While most people today no longer consider horses a part of livestock, they were indeed a big part of agriculture until roughly 1945, when the tractor over took real horsepower. During this time and beyond the steady decline of horse breeds and other livestock became evident and on March 17, 1977, a handful of concerned citizens gathered at the Vermont Department of Agriculture to sign incorporate papers for the American Minor Breeds Conservancy. In 1993, the American Minor Breeds Conservancy changed its name to the American Livestock Breeds Conservancy and in 2013 the name was shortened to The Livestock Conservancy. Over the years, the Conservancy may have had several name changes, but the one thing that never changed was the goal to protect and preserve our heritage breeds. The Livestock Conservancy does research, education, outreach, marketing and promotion, and genetic rescues to help ensure the future of rare breed agriculture.

They have a central office in Hillsboro, North Carolina, where the staff help to develop projects, produce marketing materials, connect breeders, facilitate research, and more. The staff members also travel around the country to conduct workshops, spread the word about heritage breeds, and assist with research and fieldwork. The Livestock Conservancy has a Conservation Priority List (CPL) that each breed must conform to certain genetic and numerical parameters to be considered. They have a five category list that they track the different breeds; Study, Recovering, Watch, Threatened, and Critical. Critical criteria consists of fewer than 200 annual registrations in the United States and estimated global population less than 2,000. The Livestock Conservancy conducted their first Shire census in 1985, and listed the Shire in their old category similar to their Critical category list today. The next few years, because the Shire population had increased, it was moved out of critical, then in 2008, the Shire was moved onto the Watch List, and 2009 back to the Critical List, where it still remains. They will review the Shire census in 2019 and decide if it should stay on the Critical or if it can be moved up a level to Threatened.

How can The Livestock Conservancy benefit our Shire breed? First they are a nonpartisan, non-profit organization that reports the facts of each breed given to them. They keep a running census of each of the heritage breeds year after year. They have many on-going projects, but the Master Breeders Program is one that I feel can really benefit our breed. This program is based on the fundamental premise that the existence and continuity of "old-time" (Master) breeders' knowledge is critical to conservation. Master Breeders are historians who help bridge production knowledge from this generation to the next. They are a critical resource for conservation. This project includes in-the-field interviews with recognized Master Breeders, documentation and teaching of their methods, and publication of the findings. This can be a huge conservation tool for the preservation of the Shire. But in order to have a Shire Master Breeders Program, the Association, Shire breeders and owners

must be willing to join The Livestock Conservancy and support their efforts.

The Livestock Conservancy offers several types of

memberships and benefits. One of the main benefits as a breeder is being listed in the breeder's directory, both online and in print. Once joining, you will receive a nice printed directory of all breeders and products from across the country. You can also get online and create a profile and be eligible to place

free classified ads and also be added to the online interactive map, where you can search for an individual animal breeder and/or product. You also receive a full color quarterly newsletter, plus other benefits depending on the type of membership chosen. One of the biggest benefits as a member is receiving a discounted rate to attend the annual National Heritage Livestock Conference. This year the conference is being held in historic Williamsburg, VA, November 9-12. This conference is packed full of various clinics conducted by speakers from all over the country, with options of full day or ½ day clinics. One Friday afternoon clinic is 'Social Media Marketing Options for Your Breeds', given by ASHA Life Member Dayla Kohler. Dayla is the Editor-in-Chief for the successful Foothills Times Magazine, and the owner of Kohler Farms-A Shire Horse Breeder, Dayla has diligently kept up with the changes in Facebook's Algorithms. She has an extensive understanding of their Pixel Recognition Software, Hashtags, and the top 5 online marketing options. On Saturday evening, she will also be speaking on Preserving the Shire Horse in America. Dayla purchased her first Shire in 2001, and became involved with the conservancy back in 2013 when she moved to North Carolina, and has since been a speaker at every annual conference. Because of her affiliation with the Livestock Conservancy, every year Dayla gets invited to the MOTHER EARTH NEWS FAIR in Asheville, NC. Dayla says that the Shire exposure is amazing at these events. 


Information on the breed, ASHA, the Youth Program and ASHEF were available throughout the show and many items were picked up. One membership application was also taken. The electronic photo album and an ASHA national show video were run continuously and drew a lot of attendees to the booth. As usual a number of questions were answered about Shires, including several about availability of Shires for sale. International visitors to the booth included people from Africa, England, Germany, Ireland, Scotland and Sweden.

ASHA Merchandise was offered for sale, with \$207.75 income over the two days. Additionally, many thanks to Vicky and Gene McCaffrey for donating a large number of 'vintage' Shireland t-shirts (Fox Valley Farm/Tom Smrt) to ASHEF for a fund raiser. The shirts were purchased at the spring Martin's Auction in PA and are being sold at \$5 each for adult sizes and \$3 each for youth sizes. HPD sales raised \$58.00 for ASHEF. Additional shirts will be offered to the membership and at future events.

Prebiotics & Probiotics for Horses

Horses have a unique digestive system. The front portion of the digestive system, the stomach and small intestine, utilizes enzyme digestion to break down food material. The bag portion of the digestive system, the cecum and colon, have a microbial population (bacteria, yeast, fungi) that ferment and breakdown fiber. Without micro-organisms in the hindgut, horses would not be able to digest and utilize plant material such as hay and pasture. These microbes in the hindgut break down and ferment fiber, producing volatile fatty acids that serve as a significant energy source. During this fermentation of plant fiber microbes also synthesize B vitamins and other nutrients essential to the health and wellbeing of the horse. In order to efficiently digest fiber, the microbial population of the hindgut must be healthy and their numbers at appropriate levels. There are additives that can be added to feed or used as supplements that may assist in keeping the microbes in the hindgut healthy and primed for proper digestion.

Probiotics – The term "Probiotic" is opposite to "Antibiotic". An antibiotic is a product that will actually kill or destroy certain bacteria. A probiotic is an organism thought to be beneficial to the host organism. According to the currently adopted definition by the food and agricultural organization, probiotics are: "Live microorganisms which when administered in adequate amounts confer a health benefit on the host". In this case, the host can be either bacteria within the digestive tract or the horse. Bacteria such as Lactobacillus acidophilus, Enterococcus or Streptococcus faecium are the most common types of microbes used as probiotics in horses; but certain yeasts are also be used. dac* utilizes Yea-Sacc1026 which is a live yeast culture based on Saccharomyces cerevisiae strain 1026, a yeast strain specifically selected for its influence on animal performance. Another common term used for probiotics is direct fed microbials (DFM)

Many horse owners use supplements or commercial feeds containing some or all of these microorganisms with the purpose of keeping the hindgut microbial population stabilized. Any stress such as an abrupt change in feed, the stress of putting a horse in a trailer and taking him somewhere, a visit by the veterinarian or farrier, a strenuous showing or work schedule, can disrupt the gut. A high-grain, highconcentrate, low-fiber diet may also damage or destroy microbes in the hindgut. Small amounts of these important probiotics added to the diet on a daily basis may be beneficial, as there are a myriad of things that can stress horses. It's easy to change the gut microbes very quickly; the life cycle of some of the microbes is as short as 15 minutes. Thus it's a good idea to include them in the ration. It's an inexpensive insurance policy. Research on Yea Sacc1026 in horses has shown increased fiber digestion and phosphorus digestion in horses supplemented Yea Sacc1026. This led to further studies showing increased whither heights in foals from dams supplemented with Yea Sacc1026 throughout gestation.

Since these are living organisms, the question often comes up about shelf life of the products, and whether the microbes actually make it to the hindgut when fed— can they withstand the digestive

process through the first part of the digestive tract or withstand the temperatures involved in feed processing? dac® has carefully selected specific probiotics such as Yea Sacc1026 because of its ability to withstand feed processing temperatures. Its microencapsulated technology enables it to travel unharmed to the hindgut where it is most effective.

Prebiotics – Prebiotics are non-digestible food ingredients that stimulate the growth or activity of bacteria in the digestive system. Most (but not all) prebiotics are carbohydrates— long chains of sugar molecules bound together. Common examples of prebiotics include fructooligosaccharides (FOS), xylooligosaccharides (XOS), polydextrose, mannooligosaccharides (MOS), and galactooligosaccharides (GOS).

MOS is a non-digestible sugar that has the same binding site on its surface as the small intestine. 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

Youth Achievement Program

The American Shire Horse Association Youth Achievement Program was developed by Sara Roberts in 1999. The purpose of the program is to recognize young people for spending time working and playing with Shires or Shire Sport Horses. Participants earn points for competitive events, non-competitive events, and just spending time with the horses. The points provide a little extra incentive to dedicate time and attention to the Shire breed and will earn you certificates and ASHA merchandise.

~ Registration Requirements ~

Must be an ASHA Youth member Access to an ASHA registered Shire or Shire Sport Horse Open to young people 18 and under You start earning points as soon as you enroll

Activities to earn points include, but are not limited to the following:

Trail Rides or Drives • Parades/Horse Expos • Competitive Shows Wagon Train • Ring Work/Riding or Driving Lessons • Exercising/Caring for Horses

Points are awarded as follows:

Competitive Events 5 points for entering 2 points for every second place

3 points for every first place 1 point for every third place

Non-Competitive Events 7 points for participating

Exercising/Caring for Horses 1 point per hour (the hour doesn't have to be all at one time)

A certificate will be awarded at the 50, 250, 500, 750, 1000, 1250, 1500, 2000, 2500, and 3000 points level along with ASHA merchandise, according to availability, with a graduation plaque at the completion of 3000 points.

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





