








### Mounted Archery with a Shire

When I originally thought about buying a Shire you have to ask yourself one simple question; what sports can I do with a Shire? Let me tell you right here and right now the answer is , all of them!

In early January a hunter jumper barn in Bennington, Nebraska decided to open up spots for a mounted archery clinic to be held in July of 2019. I had just started under saddle a coming 4 year old Shire and was ready to see what these gentle giants were truly capable of. I pictured myself riding my big Shire in an open green field, slinging around a bow and arrows like an irish princesses. So right away I took to desensitizing my baby legs shire! She is still so young that we do as little as possible in the saddle. Ground work, ground work, ground work.

In the past I have owned hot blooded breeds and I geared myself up for several months of her adjusting to the sound of the string vibration and the beautiful thwack sound as the arrow thumps into the target. The first day out to the barn I set up my box, laid out my distance and walked my mare over next to me to listen to the new intriguing sounds I was about to introduce to her. String drawn back, tension ready, I let it fly! Thwack!

I turn to my giant baby ready to catch her in some state of fear, interest, or at least a distaste for what





I had just bombarded her senses with, not a flinch! That's right, there she stood completely stoic and ready for me to let loose another arrow. She showed more interest in the barn cat casually sauntering by then the speed and whistle of my arrows in the air. With a new zest for the sport I decided I could take it one step further but as with anyone who owns a Shire you know, I was able to go much farther than just one more step. We ended up completing out our first full day of training with a short canter ride and a few arrows landing in the target and not just in the surrounding dirt. I spread my arms out way above my head, bow in hand and felt the air on my face as I pretended I was flying. Just simply floating across her smooth canter. We down shifted to a casual walk and all I could think was "how does absolutely everyone not want to own a Shire?!" The ease of our first real mounted archery session was stunning. The freedom that her and I both felt to move freely in the bridle. My focus on the target never broken by a spook or awkward transition. I put all of my gear up at the end of that first day proud. I planned months and we accomplished it all in less than an hour.

July rolled around so quick! I had been working on so many other important foundational training pieces, that I hadn't pulled the bow out since that first day several months ago. Nonetheless, it was clinic time! I loaded up my baby shire and headed

out for her second experience of being ridden off property. We were headed for a whole new world and environment. The clinic was setup to be half day of ground shooting and the second half of the day mounted. My mare never ever likes to miss a morning siesta so that was perfect timing for her. She laid down and snuggled up in the extra hay in her stall, lip sagging she stored up her energy for the work to follow. Once we tacked up after lunch I headed outside to the arena where we would be shooting targets. I entered the arena with 13 other horses and riders. I'm sure you have all had that first time experience with a young horse in a crowded situation. Well let me tell you, this is a Shire we are talking about. My heart was probably beating way faster than hers. Surrounded by quarter horses, paints, and thoroughbreds, stood my leggy mare taking in the lot. The other horses had forward ears, as you would expect, and high alert head carriages. In a sea of hunter jumpers my elegant draft parted the ways and navigated her feeting like a seasoned eventer. Dressed in her casual western gear I let loose my braided reins and freed my hands. Her head dropped to the dirt and took in a deep breath of relaxation. Even crowded and bumped,

she remained focused on her tasks. With every step around the arena I was repeating to myself "And this right here is why I have a Shire." This wasn't just me trusting her, this was her saying "I got you." We were first to be given our bow under saddle, first to walk the path and draw our eyes on the target. The youngest horse in the crowd and setting an example of calmness, trust, and a

willingness for it all. You know what I learned from taking my draft horse to a mounted archery clinic? I learned we can do it all. With enough time for her bones and brain to mature, I will have the chance to trail ride, enter the dressage arena, follow the whip on a hunt, tear around a barrel or two, and yes shoot mounted archery! Its not the breed but the relationship that these horses desire to have. While it would be honest to say what makes them stand out in a group is their size, I believe it is so much more than that. It's a bred in desire to please and the willingness to learn.

### Hanging Harness

If you are a draft horse enthusiast and admire the proper fit and styling of harness, its a sad sight to see what was once nice harness ruined by improper storage or hanging. Whether your choice of harness is bio, leather, or nylon, there are basic factors regarding its care that can't be ignored if you want it to last a good serviceable life. One of these is hanging it properly, whether for daily use or long term storage.



At Troika Drafts we're fans of harness racks. Ours are made locally with red oak lumber milled from our own land and we couldn't be happier. Harness hooks are fine in most cases, and we still use them on a short term basis during the work day, but our racks keep the harness well organized and in the shape its designed for. The racks also allow for easy access on the busiest of driving and schooling days.

Harness racks come in two styles, those that are wall mounted and those that set on the floor. Floor racks take up more room, but can be moved around seasonally and are easily taken to shows. Wall mounted racks are usually permanently mounted securely to a wall, though if in a specialized box type rack, they too can be moved and taken to shows if desired.


The best style of harness rack allows the harness to stay properly shaped; much like the form its in when its on your horse. There should be no bends or creases in the harness as its hanging, and one part should not crush or

weigh on another. The racks should be situated where they receive adequate air circulation, and not where they are subject to moisture, sunlight, or other harsh conditions.

One highly recommended practice is to have a harness room that is convenient but separate from your barn hallway and stall area. Ideally, this is an area you can close off, not only for security reasons, but also to keep dampness and dust off your harness. In weather that is dry the room can be left open for the flow of air, but if you live where it is humid, being able to close off and dehumidify the room will further help keep your harness in lasting condition. Additionally, a separate room will tend to keep birds, rodents, and other contaminates from your harness. And for those in colder climates a small tack room may also enable a bit of heat in the winter, allowing for harness that dries well and bits that stay warm and ready for use. Note as well, leather harness ages more quickly if it freezes, so if leather is your choice, a heated tack room should be a definite part of your plans.

Easy care tips for hanging harness:

Ensure the rack sections that hold your harness are at least a few inches wide and well rounded so as not to cause creasing or bending. This is especially important if the harness will hang for a long period of time before its used again. All harnesses, especially leather, will retain some degree of "memory" when forced and held into a shape for a long degree of time.

outside the collar or on its own holder. Bridles are easily misshapen and the blinders and winkler stays damaged if a collar or other parts of the harness are weighted on them.

Collars and collar pads should always be wiped clean and dry after use, then hung upside down and backwards and on the outside or separate from the harness. This keeps them dry and prevents the area that rests on the horses neck from becoming misshapen due to any pressure from the rack or other parts of the harness.

Biothane and nylon harness can be rinsed right on the horse! Hang them on a rack out of the hot sun and ideally in a breeze to dry before storing inside.

Lines should be draped "long and light" along with the harness. Always drape lines where they are clear of buckles or adjustments; never crease driving lines near the buckle or in areas where they adjust as this increases wear in the areas where lines are the weakest.

Take the time at least once a year to thoroughly clean and inspect the bolts of your hames and heal chains. A stiff wire brush will remove any rust and a little bee's wax (or other non-dust attracting lubricant) rubbed into the bolts will keep them easier to remove for the next cleaning.

Make it a core behavior to automatically inspect your harness every time you harness and unharness your horse. Take special care and repair any stitching that may be coming loose, and replace parts that are starting to crack or show excessive wear. In addition, pay attention to stitching and adjustment holes near buckles and conways. These areas may look fine, but the holes can split or stretch under stress and damage may not be visible unless closely inspected.

With the best of care, a harness that is used often has a life expectancy of 10-15 years. A well cared for harness, hung properly and kept dry, not only provides working comfort for your draft, it preserves your investment for years to come.

### A DIRTY LITTLE SECRET

If you own or care for a stallion or gelding, either you must become educated about sheath cleaning, or you should have your veterinarian or an experienced horse person handle the task.

The sheath is a double fold of skin that covers the drawn-up penis. There are sebaceous glands in the lining of the sheath that produces an oily, waxy secretion called sebum, to lubricate and provide a protective covering for the penis. When this secretion mixes with dying skin cells, it causes a gray to black material called smegma. These secretions can build up and accumulate into a soft, wax-like deposit, or create dry, hard flakes. This is normal and the amount of smegma produced varies between each horse. For example, horses with white pigmentation on their penises seem to produce more smegma than horses with dark penises. Excessive smegma accumulation is extremely rare and usually associated with skin conditions or lesions, like herpes virus or squamous cell carcinoma—a

common tumor found on the penis—that need to be diagnosed by your veterinarian. (Ben Espy 2016)

A Dirty Little Secret Continued

Rumor has it that a dirty sheath, containing a mixture of dirt and urine can lead to infections or urinary problems. This is possible, but rare.

There was a study (Beaver, Delaware Valley College in Pennsylvania 2013) that found the more you clean the sheath, the greater the chances of an infection. Cultures were taken and bacteria colonies were counted on a group of male horses before sheath cleaning; they were divided into four study groups, with one group, not cleaned, one group cleaned with rinse water, one group cleaned with commercial sheath cleaning product, and one group cleaned with baby shampoo. Cleanings and testing were done three times, with three weeks between each cleaning. What did this research project discover?

Samples taken after cleaning showed significantly more bacterial growth—from 10 to 100 times more—than the first set of samples taken. (The bacteria identified did not pose a direct threat to the horses, but some types have been linked to urinary tract infections.)

The horses that were washed with the commercial product had the greatest increase in bacterial numbers after cleaning. Those washed with plain water had the least.

The buildup of smegma returned to pre-washing levels within the three weeks between cleanings. "Cleaning the sheath can cause a response from the body increasing smegma build-up," Beaver reports.

There were more bacteria both before and after the second and third cleanings than before and after the first cleaning.

In short, cleaning set the stage for bacterial growth. Why? Beaver says that proteins in smegma have antimicrobial properties. She confirmed this in the lab by isolating the proteins and performing an assay. "I placed protein in broth with various bacteria, including bacteria I isolated from the sheath cleanings," she explains. The proteins inhibited bacterial growth.

Cleaning stallions too often, also found that their average conception rate was 70%, compared to wild stallions of around 85%.

What about that bean thing, I have heard needs to be removed?

Smegma can accumulate in the depression at the end of the penis, called the urethral fossa. Commonly known as the "bean," this smegma plug can vary from about the size of a small eraser to a lima bean. A bean can cause infection or interfere with the passage of urine if it is allowed to become very large, but usually the force of a horse's urine stream is far too strong to be inhibited by any amount of smegma. If you notice that your horse's urination stream seems obstructed or just dribbles, you need to check him for a bean.

A small bean can be worked out with your finger, but a large one might be difficult to remove; trying to get it will be painful to the horse and he'll resist. This is when you need to call in your veterinarian. The horse might have to be tranquilized so he will relax the penis and let it down. A large bean might have to be crushed into pieces with a finger or blunt instrument for removal,

### Shire Horse History In America

### Chapter 4 Part 2


Please note: This work is an excerpt from a larger book with earlier installments in previous newsletters and is to be taken as the opinion of the author.

I believe the founders of the 1878 English Cart Horse Society had a bias towards the Lincolnshire Fens type of horse over the Leicestershire type. The heavy horses bred in Lincolnshire were large with heavy legs and lots of hair. They were not typically exported and were in fact the favorites of the men who lived in that area - the same men who formed the first society (renamed the Shire Horse Society in 1884).

Draft horses known as the Leicestershire Black were bred in the English Midlands around Leicester and Derby and were considered an all-purpose horse. Robert Bakewell (1725-1795) and others bred them to have a more compact body, move quickly, and have shorter hair on the legs. They met the commercial needs of the English, the export market and the Scottish market. These horses became the foundation stock for the Shire in the American registry.

A story of Lawrence Drew, a truly knowledgeable horseman and a leading figure in the advancement of the Clydesdale breed and the first President of the Clydesdale Society in Scotland, illustrates the marketability of the Leicestershire type. He was riding by train through the Derbyshire area and saw a farmer in a nearby field working a pair of Leicestershire type horses. He got off the train at the next stop and made his way back to that farm and tried to buy the team. At first the farmer refused, but in the end, Drew bought all the farmer's horses including his breeding stock. There was a steady flow of horses moving back and forth across the Scottish border for many years, so this was not unusual, but the story clearly shows this common practice.

Personalities and in some cases the lack of practical horse experience set a questionable course for the new registry. Francis Charles Granville



From Sir Walter Gilbey's book "The Old English War Horse," published in 1888, plate 9 depicts "Dodman." An engraving by Woodward, this Derbyshire horse was born in 1780 and Gilbey credits him with illustrating the characteristics of a Lincolnshire type cart horse.

Egerton, third Earl of Ellsmere (1847-1914) had a 13,300 acre estate called, Worsley Hall, near Manchester and devoted 1,000 acres to the development and breeding of Lincolnshire type horses. His efforts, along with his farm manager and horseman Captain Henry Heaton, a Fenman from Chattris, played a major role in forming the new registry. According to Keith Chivers in his 1976 book *The Shire Horse*, the Earl is responsible for suggesting to Frederic Street that he make a motion to the Farmer's Club (founded in London in 1842 and still in existance) to form the English Cart Horse Society and had a key role in influencing the horses that were registered. The list of founding members of the society had more resemblance to a social register than credible horse breeders.



Many of the original Shire records were lost during World War II when the offices of the Shire Horse Society were located in London. A German bomb made nearly a direct hit on the building and a major fire erupted. The bomb damage, plus the fire that followed, destroyed nearly everything above ground. The Shire office had a basement where the historical records were kept, but it was flooded with five feet of water from the effort to put out the fire. The loss of those records leaves us with limited knowledge of the happenings of those early days and we are dependent on the published works of Frederic Street, who suggest-

ed the formation of the Society; Sir Walter Gilbey, the first president of the Society; A.B. Charlton, an early Secretary of the Society; and Richard S. Reynolds who provided over a thousand pedigrees in the creation of the first stud book.

In Sir Walter Gilbey's 1888 book, The Great Horse, he notes financial profits for these draft horses were so great that aristocratic large landowners became breeders under their own names. They also became influential in the horses produced as they could afford to own the more expensive and better stallions. At one time they limited the use of these stallions to their tenant farmers. Gilbey (1831-1914) made his fortune marketing inexpensive wine and gin. He owned and bred heavy horses as a hobby and also promoted the Scottish Clyde, Hackney Horse and the English Hunter.

Frederic Street may have been an educator or a government agent, someone important in the field of agriculture who was looked to as an industry expert. Street and his brother George had a farm in the Fens; he came with


a built-in criterion of what the Cart Horse should look like. He favored the Lincolnshire type, but in his writing, he calls for a slightly different type even though he was openly and strongly against the cleaner-legged Leicestershire type.

Thomas Horrocks Miller, who owned a cotton mill, was the founder of Flyde Cart Stud Horse Company in Lancashire. He purchased Honest Tom; bred by William Welcher in 1865 in the village of Watton in Norfolk, which borders Lincolnshire. Honest Tom took the first prize six years in a row at the Royal Show from 1867-1872, according to Frederick Street, and sold for 500 pounds in 1871. Incidentally, Honest Tom was thought to epitomize the characteristics of an English Cart Horse and his image is still used by the American Shire Horse Association. It is clear that Miller and others with horses that reflected the Lincolnshire type of Shire benefited from both a registry and society that featured them.

The newly formed breed society was first named the Old English Cart Horse, which incorporated all the different types of heavy horses. However, many of these prominent leaders wanted a more limited type, and it was Street who suggested the name Shire. Gilbey thought it was a good idea and advanced the proposal. This move created a controversy which goes far beyond a simple name and feelings ran deep. In the end, though, it was the Lincolnshire type that reflected the breed standard for the Shire.

although this is not usually the case. Many horses find this uncomfortable and won't tolerate your efforts without sedation, so veterinary supervision might be necessary.

Not only is sheath cleaning unnecessary, it can often be harmful. The traditional method of poking a hose up into the sheath and scrubbing it and the penis with sponges and antibacterial soap removes the natural protective covering and healthy bacteria population, potentially causing micro abrasions and sores.

If you feel absolutely compelled to clean your horse's penis for cosmetic reasons before a show, follow a quick, efficient, soap-free procedure. To encourage him to let down for cleaning, try bathing him on a warm, sunny day. Then stand by his front legs to avoid getting stepped on if he sidesteps during the process. Wearing disposable gloves gently grasp the end of his penis with one hand and run the other hand up the shaft, knocking off the smegma. You should be able to clean the penis adequately this way without using water. If necessary, though, you can run a small stream of warm water over the penis—but avoid scrubbing with towels or sponges. Then pat the penis dry with paper towels.

If your horse doesn't relax enough to let down or refuses to stand still for the procedure, don't resort to more forceful restraints. This will just stimulate his fear mechanism, making it harder to clean his sheath in the future. Instead, ask your veterinarian to sedate him and perform the cleaning for you.

Expect whatever cleaning you do to be short-lived. Normal smegma production will restore the accumulation to your horse's regular level within about a week. (Ben Espy 2016)
